

Mgr. Ota Pavláček, Ph.D., Th.D.

Curriculum vitae

Ota Pavláček is an expert in the field of research on scholarly elites in earlier history and the roots of the Western scientific tradition, with an emphasis on Central and Western Europe, universities, intellectual practice, the production and transmission of knowledge, and the history of the Bohemian Reformation. He also works in the field of Digital Humanities. He is the first holder of an ERC Starting Grant in the historical sciences primarily anchored at a Czech research institution. At the Institute of Philosophy of the Czech Academy of Sciences, he works as a senior scholar, deputy head of the Department for the Study of Ancient and Medieval Thought, and coordinator and founder of the Research Group for Transdisciplinary Investigation of Philosophical, Textual, and Intellectual Culture in the Early Universities.

He obtained his doctorate as part of co-tutelle studies at the Sorbonne and Charles University, while also working at EHESS in Paris, Universität Wien, and *Monumenta Germaniae Historica* in Munich. He completed postdoctoral stays at King's College London, Università degli Studi di Milano, Institut de recherche et d'histoire des textes CNRS in Paris, and the Thomas Institut at Universität zu Köln. He has been the recipient of several prestigious scholarships (Alexander von Humboldt Foundation Scholarship, *Monumenta Germaniae Historica* Scholarship, French government scholarship, CENDARI scholarship).

His current research focuses on the ERC project ACADEMIA (erc-academia.com), which deals with debates "de quolibet". Among his findings is that these late medieval and early modern debates stood at the birth of the tradition of today's scientific conferences, including the presentation of innovative results at scientific meetings and their subsequent publication. Pavláček thus contributes to the knowledge of our scientific tradition and its roots in an international context, building on a number of his previous collective projects, especially that on the Prague disputation of 1409 (1409debate.com). He also participates in the Lindat/Clariah project, within which he and his team developed the digital application UniQ on the dispute about universals (uniq.flu.cas.cz), and participates in the development of the OptiQ application including the textual tradition to the history of optics.

His outputs are mainly studies (sometimes including critical editions of texts previously accessible only in medieval manuscripts) in international journals and edited monographs; they include the books *Studying the Arts in Late Medieval Bohemia* (Brepols 2021), *The Great Debate: The 1409 Quodlibetal Debate at the Prague Faculty of Arts* (Brepols 2024, with L. Campi) and *A Companion to Jan Hus* (Brill 2015, with F. Šmahel). The latter is an authoritative volume on its subject, and was selected by the Czech Academy of Sciences as the most significant publication of the Czech Academy in the field of social sciences and humanities in 2015. His works have been cited or reviewed at least on 179 occasions.

His results have been recognised in several awards: from the Bolzano Prize of the Rector of Charles University for his master's thesis through the Josef Hlávka Prizes to the Otto Wichterle Award for selected, exceptionally high-quality and promising scientific workers of the Czech Academy of Sciences. His most significant award to date is the Seal of Excellence awarded to him by the European Research Council (ERC) for a transfer project. Junior collaborators in his team are also already receiving awards for their work (Otto Wichterle Premium, SIEPM Junior Scholar Award).

He is the founder and head of the editorial series *Intellectual Practice and Thought at Late Medieval and Early Modern Universities* at Brepols Publishers. He also founded the international conference series *Studying the Arts in Late Medieval Bohemia* and a series of international workshops on *International Consultation in Studying the Arts in Late Medieval Bohemia*. He has organized a number of international scientific meetings, including the annual conference of the international society *Societas Artistarum* for research into the history of the faculties of liberal arts, and in 2024 he is organizing a significant conference of the *Société Internationale pour l'Étude de la Philosophie Médiévale* in Prague. Since 2021, he has also been organizing the irregular *Prague Talks on Digital Humanities*.

He is regularly invited to give individual and conference lectures, having spoken almost fifty times in total. He collaborates with many colleagues from the Czech Republic, Europe, and the USA, and was instrumental in establishing institutional cooperation with IRHT CNRS and Università degli Studi di Milano. He is a permanent delegate of the Czech Academy of Sciences at the Union Académique Internationale.

I am the editor of the recently established IPA series, which aims at the history of thought and scholarly practice at medieval and early modern universities between the fourteenth and sixteenth centuries with an emphasis on philosophy and the natural sciences, including related university teaching and various scholarly debates and disputations. Geographically, IPA focuses on areas where “new” universities sprung up in Europe, such as in Central Europe, and on the relations between these “new” universities with other intellectual centres such as Paris or Oxford. In terms of chronology, IPA understands the intellectual history of this period as something continuous and without artificial divisions: concepts such as the late Middle Ages, early modern times, renaissance, scholasticism, humanism or reformation gradually find new meanings and become translucent and plastic, as the sharp differences among them blur due to ongoing research. Methodologically, IPA is open

to different approaches and interdisciplinarity and allows for monographs, the publication of case studies accompanied by editions of Latin texts, catalogues of textual corpora, or edited volumes. Overall, the aim of IPA is to create a platform for the publication of scientific research examining intellectual practice, knowledge production and dissemination in Europe (including through the study of little-known and unexplored medieval and early modern manuscripts).
