

Mgr. Ota Pavlíček, Ph.D., Th.D.

Curriculum vitae

Research focuses on medieval and early modern intellectual culture, with particular attention to scholarly elites, universities, and the emergence of the Western scientific tradition. It examines intellectual practice, the production and transmission of knowledge, and the history of the Bohemian Reformation, combining intellectual history and the history of thought with Digital Humanities approaches. This research has been supported by a number of major grants, including the first ERC Starting Grant in the humanities hosted primarily by a Czech research institution.

Currently Senior Researcher at the Institute of Philosophy of the Czech Academy of Sciences, serving as Deputy Head of the Department for the Study of Ancient and Medieval Thought and Head of the TRIPTIC-EU research group (Research Group for Transdisciplinary Investigation of Philosophical, Textual, and Intellectual Culture in the Early Universities). Academic training includes a doctorate completed in a co-tutelle programme between the Sorbonne and Charles University. This experience has been further developed through fellowships at leading European institutions, including EHESS (Paris), Universität Wien, Monumenta Germaniae Historica (Munich), King's College London, Università degli Studi di Milano, IRHT CNRS (Paris), and the Thomas-Institut at Universität zu Köln, with additional support from institutions such as the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation and Monumenta Germaniae Historica.

Extensive experience includes roles as Principal Investigator or Research Leader on eight funded research projects. Since 2019, interdisciplinary teams of 4–12 scholars have been coordinated across four major grant-funded projects, integrating expertise from history, philosophy, philology, and digital humanities. This work involves coordinating complex research agendas, supervising early-career researchers, and developing collaborative research infrastructures, including the supervision and hosting of fellows funded by Marie Skłodowska-Curie Actions (MSCA) and the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation.

Current research centres on the ERC project *ACADEMIA*, which investigates late medieval and early modern Arts quodlibetal debates and demonstrates their role in shaping practices central to modern scientific communication, including the public presentation of new results and their subsequent collective publication. Building on earlier collaborative projects — notably the study of the Prague disputation of 1409 — this research is further developed within the Lindat/Clariah infrastructure, where the UniQ application has been developed and further tools (OptiQ and QuodlibetiQ) are currently under development.

Publications include studies and critical editions of previously unedited medieval texts in leading international journals and edited volumes, including edited monographs such as *Studying the Arts in Late Medieval Bohemia* (Brepols, 2021), *The Greatest Debate: The 1409 Quodlibetal Debate at the Prague Faculty of Arts* (Brepols, 2025, with L. Campi), and *A Companion to Jan Hus* (Brill, 2015, with F. Šmahel), the latter selected by the Czech Academy of Sciences as its most significant humanities publication of the year.

Academic contributions are complemented by a range of distinctions, including the Otto Wichterle Award of the Czech Academy of Sciences, the ERC Seal of Excellence (2023), and the Neuron Prize (2025). Further activities include founding and editing the Brepols series *Intellectual Practice and Thought at Late Medieval and Early Modern Universities*, establishing the conference series *Studying the Arts in Late Medieval Bohemia*, and organising the *Prague Talks on Digital Humanities*.

Regularly invited to present at international conferences and workshops, with more than 50 papers delivered, and extensive experience in organising or co-organising scholarly events (30 in total). Institutional engagement includes serving as Permanent Delegate of the Czech Academy of Sciences to the Union Académique Internationale and contributing to the development of international collaborations, notably with IRHT CNRS and Università degli Studi di Milano.

I am the editor of the recently established IPA series, which aims at the history of thought and scholarly practice at medieval and early modern universities between the fourteenth and sixteenth centuries with an emphasis on philosophy and the natural sciences, including related university teaching and various scholarly debates and disputations. Geographically, IPA focuses on areas where “new” universities sprung up in Europe, such as in Central Europe, and on the relations between these “new” universities with other intellectual centres such as Paris or Oxford. In terms of chronology, IPA understands the intellectual history of this period as something continuous and without artificial divisions: concepts such as the late Middle Ages, early modern times, renaissance, scholasticism, humanism or reformation gradually find new meanings and become translucent and plastic, as the sharp differences among them blur due to ongoing research. Methodologically, IPA is open to different approaches and interdisciplinarity and allows for monographs, the publication of case studies accompanied by editions of Latin texts, catalogues of textual corpora, or edited volumes. Overall, the aim of IPA is to create a platform for the publication of scientific research examining intellectual practice, knowledge production and dissemination in Europe (including through the study of little-known and unexplored medieval and early modern manuscripts).
